1 AN ACT concerning

Office of the Attorney General – Firearm Crime, Injuries, Fatalities, and Crime <u>Firearms</u> – Study

4 FOR the purpose of requiring the Office of the Attorney General to study and identify $\mathbf{5}$ certain information relating to certain firearm crimes, injuries, fatalities, and crime 6 firearms; requiring all State and local law enforcement agencies and other 7governmental units to provide the Office of the Attorney General with certain 8 information; requiring the Office of the Attorney General to report certain findings 9 and conclusions to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before certain 10 dates; defining a certain term terms; providing for the termination of this Act; and 11 generally relating to crimes involving firearms, injuries and fatalities caused by 12firearms, and crime firearms.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
