1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 15.1-06 and a new section to
2 chapter 15.1-32 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to school purchases of gifts or
3 gratuities and permitting private tutors on public school premises; to amend and reenact
4 sections 15.1-01-03, 15.1-07-25.4, and 15.1-07-26, subsection 8 of section 15.1-15-02,
5 subsections 2 and 6 of section 15.1-19-10, section 15.1-27-03.1, subsection 4 of section
6 15.1-27-03.2, sections 15.1-27-04.1, 15.1-36-02, and 15.1-36-04, and subsection 5 of section
7 15.1-36-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the state board of public school
8 education members, virtual learning, a policy to revert a reorganized school district back to
9 separate districts, school district enrollment, the definition of "probationary teacher", a school
10 district's policy governing possession of a weapon, the definition of "dangerous weapon",
11 modification of weighting factors and transition maximums, loans from the coal development
12 trust fund, evidences of indebtedness, and an increase in per student payments; to provide for a
13 legislative management study; to provide a legislative management report; to provide for a
14 teacher shortage and military families task force; to provide an appropriation; to provide for an
15 exemption; to provide for a transfer; to provide an effective date; and to declare an emergency.

16 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

17 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is
18 amended and reenacted as follows:

19 **15.1-01-03. State board of public school education - Powers and duties.**

- 20 1. The state board of public school education shall:
- 21 a. Assist county committees in carrying out their duties.
- 22 b. Provide county committees with clerical assistance, plans of procedure,
23 standards, data, maps, forms, and other materials, information, and services.

- 1 c. Appoint members to the county committee, if the county superintendent does not
- 2 fulfill this duty, as provided for in section 15.1-10-01.
- 3 d. Provide oversight for regional education associations as required by chapter
- 4 15.1-09.1.
- 5 e. Establish and certify a North Dakota learning continuum to allow a
- 6 district-approved, mastery framework policy to award units required under
- 7 sections 15.1-21-01 and 15.1-21-02 and to waive unit instructional time
- 8 requirements under section 15.1-21-03, upon the recommendation of the
- 9 kindergarten through grade twelve education coordination council.
- 10 f. Develop a policy and procedures for a school district formed by the
- 11 reorganization process under chapter 15.1-12 to revert to individual school
- 12 districts. For a reorganized school district to be eligible for the reversion process,
- 13 the reorganized school district must have been formed by school districts located
- 14 in two or more communities, including a rural community, and may not have been
- 15 formed by school districts that were located in the same city. The board shall
- 16 develop the policy and procedures on or before January 1, 2024.
- 17 2. The state board of public school education may adopt rules in accordance with
- 18 chapter 28-32.

19 **SECTION 2.** A new section to chapter 15.1-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
20 and enacted as follows:

21 **Purchase of gifts or gratuities - Gift fund.**

- 22 1. A public school or school district may create a gift fund. The gift fund may not include
- 23 state funds.
- 24 2. A public school or school district may use funds from the gift fund to purchase an item
- 25 as a gift or gratuity for an individual, including a school district employee, an individual
- 26 who speaks or performs at a school function, or a guest on the school premises.
- 27 3. For purposes of this section, "gift" includes:
 - 28 a. A beverage, food item, or refreshment;
 - 29 b. For parent-teacher conferences, beverages, food items, or refreshments, costing
 - 30 no more than twenty-five dollars per teacher;
 - 31 c. A catered meal costing no more than fifty dollars per meal;

- 1 d. Pens, notepads, or other promotional materials;
- 2 e. An item of cultural significance, including a quilt, basket, beadwork, sage, or
- 3 quillwork;
- 4 f. An award or incentive, as approved by the superintendent of public instruction or
- 5 the superintendent's designee; and
- 6 g. Any other item of de minimis value.

7 **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-07-25.4 of the North Dakota Century Code is
8 amended and reenacted as follows:

9 **15.1-07-25.4. Virtual learning - School district policy - Report to legislative**
10 **management and legislative assembly.**

11 The board of a school district or governing board of a nonpublic school that operates a
12 physical school plant may adopt a policy to allow students to engage in virtual instruction and in
13 the case of a school district, qualify for average daily membership in the district. The
14 superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules governing policies under this section. A
15 policy adopted by a school district under this section must comply with the rules adopted by the
16 superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide
17 ~~biennial reports~~an annual report to the legislative management ~~regarding~~in even-numbered
18 years and the legislative assembly in odd-numbered years comparing the academic
19 performance ~~metrics~~ of students participating in virtual instruction with students not participating
20 in virtual instruction under this section using the statewide prekindergarten through grade twelve
21 strategic vision framework goals. If the superintendent of public instruction does not have
22 access to academic performance reports of a school district's virtual instruction subgroup
23 because of low group size, the district shall provide the annual report required under this
24 section for the district's comparison data.

25 **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-07-26 of the North Dakota Century Code is
26 amended and reenacted as follows:

27 **15.1-07-26. School district demographics**~~enrollment~~ **- Long-term planning-**
28 **process**Review - Report.

- 29 1. Between January first and June thirtieth of every even-numbered year, the board of
- 30 each school district shall invite the public to participate in a ~~planning process~~review
- 31 addressing the effects that demographics might~~decreasing or increasing enrollment~~

1 will have on the district in the ensuing three-year and five-year periods, and
2 specifically addressing potential effects on:

3 a. ~~Academic and extracurricular programs~~achievement including progress toward
4 state academic goals adopted by the statewide prekindergarten through grade
5 twelve education strategic vision steering committee;

6 b. ~~Instructional and administrative, and ancillary~~ staffing;

7 c. Co-curricular or extracurricular programs;

8 d. Facility needs and utilization; and

9 ~~d.e.~~ District property tax levies.

10 2. At the conclusion of the ~~planning process~~review, the board shall prepare a report,
11 ~~publish a notice in the official newspaper of the district indicating that the report is~~
12 ~~available~~submit the report to the superintendent of public instruction by August first of
13 each even-numbered year, make the report available on the district website, and make
14 the report available upon request.

15 3. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide an aggregate report on these
16 plans to the legislative assembly.

17 **SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 8 of section 15.1-15-02 of the North Dakota
18 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

19 8. For purposes of this section, "probationary teacher" means an individual teaching for
20 less than two years in the school district.

21 **SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 2 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota
22 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

23 2. The policy must ~~prohibit~~;

24 a. Prohibit the possession of a dangerous weapon or a firearm by a student on
25 school property and at school functions and provide for the punishment of any
26 student found to be in violation. ~~Punishment must include immediate suspension~~
27 ~~from school and expulsion. A~~

28 b. Require a student who possesses a firearm in violation of this section must to be
29 expelled for at least one year. ~~The school district firearms policy must authorize~~

30 c. Authorize the school district superintendent or the school principal, if the school
31 district does not have a superintendent, to modify an expulsion for firearms

1 possession under this section on a case-by-case basis in accordance with criteria
2 established by the board. Before expelling a student, a school board or its
3 designated hearing officer, within ten days of the student's suspension, shall
4 provide the student with a hearing at which time the school board or its
5 designated hearing officer shall take testimony and consider evidence, including
6 the existence of mitigating circumstances. If a designated hearing officer orders
7 that a student be expelled, the student may seek a review of the decision by the
8 school board, based on the record of the expulsion hearing.

- 9 d. Include a referral mechanism to the criminal justice or juvenile delinquency
10 system for a student who possesses a firearm in violation of this subsection.

11 **SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 6 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota
12 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

13 6. For purposes of this section:

14 a. "Dangerous weapon" has the meaning provided in 18 U.S.C. 930(g)(2).

15 b. "Firearm" has the meaning provided in Public Law No. 90-351 [82 Stat. 197;
16 18 U.S.C. 921].

17 b.c. "School property" includes all land within the perimeter of the school site and all
18 school buildings, structures, facilities, and school vehicles, whether owned or
19 leased by a school district, and the site of any school-sponsored event or activity.

20 **SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-03.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
21 amended and reenacted as follows:

22 **15.1-27-03.1. Weighted average daily membership - Determination.**

23 1. For each school district, the superintendent of public instruction shall multiply by:

24 a. 1.00 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in an extended
25 educational program in accordance with section 15.1-32-17;

26 b. 0.60 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in a summer education
27 program, including a migrant summer education program;

28 c. 0.40 the number of full-time equivalent students who:

- 29 (1) On a test of English language proficiency approved by the superintendent of
30 public instruction are determined to be least proficient and placed in the first
31 of six categories of proficiency; and

- 1 (2) Are enrolled in a program of instruction for English language learners;
- 2 d. 0.28 the number of full-time equivalent students who:
- 3 (1) On a test of English language proficiency approved by the superintendent of
- 4 public instruction are determined to be more proficient than students placed
- 5 in the first of six categories of proficiency and therefore placed in the second
- 6 of six categories of proficiency; and
- 7 (2) Are enrolled in a program of instruction for English language learners;
- 8 e. 0.25 the number of full-time equivalent students under the age of twenty-one
- 9 enrolled in grades nine through twelve in an alternative high school;
- 10 f. 0.20 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in a home-based
- 11 education program and monitored by the school district under chapter 15.1-23;
- 12 g. 0.17 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in an early childhood
- 13 special education program;
- 14 h. 0.15 the number of full-time equivalent students in grades six through eight
- 15 enrolled in an alternative education program for at least an average of fifteen
- 16 hours per week;
- 17 i. 0.10 the number of students enrolled in average daily membership, if the district
- 18 has fewer than one hundred students enrolled in average daily membership and
- 19 the district consists of an area greater than two hundred seventy-five square
- 20 miles [19424.9 hectares], provided that any school district consisting of an area
- 21 greater than six hundred square miles [155399 hectares] and enrolling fewer than
- 22 fifty students in average daily membership must be deemed to have an
- 23 enrollment equal to fifty students in average daily membership;
- 24 j. ~~0.08~~0.088 the number of students enrolled in average daily membership, in
- 25 order to support the provision of special education services;
- 26 k. 0.07 the number of full-time equivalent students who:
- 27 (1) On a test of English language proficiency approved by the superintendent of
- 28 public instruction are determined to be more proficient than students placed
- 29 in the second of six categories of proficiency and therefore placed in the
- 30 third of six categories of proficiency;
- 31 (2) Are enrolled in a program of instruction for English language learners; and

- 1 (3) Have not been in the third of six categories of proficiency for more than
2 three years;
- 3 l. 0.025 the number of students representing that percentage of the total number of
4 students in average daily membership which is equivalent to the three-year
5 average percentage of students in grades three through eight who are eligible for
6 free or reduced lunches under the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act
7 [42 U.S.C. 1751 et seq.];
- 8 m. 0.002 the number of students enrolled in average daily membership in a school
9 district that is a participating member of a regional education association meeting
10 the requirements of chapter 15.1-09.1;
- 11 n. ~~0.601.0~~ the number of students by which the district's September tenth
12 enrollment report, adjusted for students that will generate average daily
13 membership, exceeds the number of students in the prior year's average daily
14 membership ~~increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00~~; and
- 15 o. For districts paid based on September tenth enrollment in the prior year, ~~0.500.70~~
16 the number of students determined by deducting the number of students in the
17 prior year's September tenth enrollment, adjusted for students that will generate
18 average daily membership, from the prior year's average daily membership,
19 increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00. If the prior year's
20 September tenth enrollment exceeds the prior year's average daily membership,
21 then a deduction of 0.50 the number of excess students, increasing the factor
22 annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00.
- 23 2. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine each school district's weighted
24 average daily membership by adding the products derived under subsection 1 to the
25 district's average daily membership.

26 **SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Subdivision o of subsection 1 of section 15.1-27-03.1 of the
27 North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

- 28 o. For districts paid based on September tenth enrollment in the prior year, ~~0.701.00~~
29 the number of students determined by deducting the number of students in the
30 prior year's September tenth enrollment, adjusted for students that will generate
31 average daily membership, from the prior year's average daily membership,

1 increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00. If the prior year's
2 September tenth enrollment exceeds the prior year's average daily membership,
3 then a deduction of ~~0.50~~1.00 the number of excess students, increasing the
4 factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00.

5 **SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 4 of section 15.1-27-03.2 of the North Dakota
6 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

7 4. The school district size weighting factor determined under this section and multiplied
8 by a school district's weighted average daily membership equals the district's weighted
9 student units. ~~For the 2022-23 school year, for school districts that operate multiple~~
10 ~~kindergarten through grade twelve buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers]~~
11 ~~apart, or multiple buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers] apart with no~~
12 ~~replicated grades, the superintendent of public instruction shall determine the school~~
13 ~~size weighting factor for each building separately. The superintendent of public~~
14 ~~instruction shall multiply the school size weighting factor for each building by the~~
15 ~~school district's weighted average daily membership to determine each building's~~
16 ~~weighted student units. The superintendent of public instruction shall combine the~~
17 ~~weighted student units of all buildings in the school district to determine the school~~
18 ~~district's weighted student units.~~

19 **SECTION 11. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-04.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
20 amended and reenacted as follows:

21 **15.1-27-04.1. Baseline funding - Establishment - Determination of state aid. (Effective**
22 **through June 30, 2025)**

23 1. To determine the amount of state aid payable to each district, the superintendent of
24 public instruction shall establish each district's baseline funding. A district's baseline
25 funding consists of:
26 a. All state aid received by the district in accordance with chapter 15.1-27 during the
27 2018-19 school year;
28 b. An amount equal to the property tax deducted by the superintendent of public
29 instruction to determine the 2018-19 state aid payment;
30 c. An amount equal to seventy-five percent of the revenue received by the school
31 district during the 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types:

- 1 (1) Revenue reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota school district
2 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the
3 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08;
- 4 (2) Mineral revenue received by the school district through direct allocation from
5 the state treasurer and not reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota
6 school district financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by
7 the superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section
8 15.1-02-08;
- 9 (3) Tuition reported under code 1300 of the North Dakota school district
10 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the
11 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08,
12 with the exception of revenue received specifically for the operation of an
13 educational program provided at a residential treatment facility, tuition
14 received for the provision of an adult farm management program, and
15 beginning in the 2021-22 school year, seventeen percent of tuition received
16 under an agreement to educate students from a school district on an
17 air force base with funding received through federal impact aid, and an
18 additional seventeen percent of tuition received under an agreement to
19 educate students from a school district on an air force base with funding
20 received through federal impact aid each school year thereafter, until the
21 2024-25 school year when sixty-eight percent of tuition received under an
22 agreement to educate students from a school district on an air force base
23 with funding received through federal impact aid must be excluded from the
24 tuition calculation under this paragraph;
- 25 (4) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on the distribution and transmission
26 of electric power;
- 27 (5) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on electricity generated from
28 sources other than coal; and
- 29 (6) Revenue from the leasing of land acquired by the United States for which
30 compensation is allocated to the state under 33 U.S.C. 701(c)(3);

- 1 d. An amount equal to the total revenue received by the school district during the
2 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types:
- 3 (1) Mobile home tax revenue;
- 4 (2) Telecommunications tax revenue; and
- 5 (3) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes and state reimbursement of the
6 homestead credit and disabled veterans credit; and
- 7 e. Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall reduce the
8 baseline funding for any school district that becomes an elementary district
9 pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2012-13 school year. The reduction must
10 be proportional to the number of weighted student units in the grades that are
11 offered through another school district relative to the total number of weighted
12 student units the school district offered in the year before the school district
13 became an elementary district. The reduced baseline funding applies to the
14 calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district
15 becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter. For districts that
16 become an elementary district prior to the 2020-21 school year, the
17 superintendent shall use the reduced baseline funding to calculate state aid for
18 the 2020-21 school year and for each year thereafter.
- 19 2. a. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in
20 subsection 1 by the district's 2017-18 weighted student units to determine the
21 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit.
- 22 b. For any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section
23 15.1-07-27 after the 2017-18 school year, the superintendent shall adjust the
24 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit used to calculate state aid.
25 The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in
26 subsection 1 by the district's weighted student units after the school district
27 becomes an elementary district to determine the district's adjusted baseline
28 funding per weighted student unit. The superintendent shall use the district's
29 adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit in the calculation of state aid
30 for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary
31 district and for each year thereafter.

- 1 c. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year and for each school year thereafter, the
2 superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student
3 unit. Each year the superintendent shall calculate the amount by which the
4 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per
5 weighted student unit provided in subsection 3. The superintendent shall reduce
6 the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit by fifteen percent of the
7 amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds
8 the payment per weighted student unit for the 2021-22 school year. For each
9 year thereafter, the reduction percentage is increased by an additional fifteen
10 percent. However, the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, after
11 the reduction, may not be less than the payment per weighted student unit
12 provided in subsection 3.
- 13 3. a. For the ~~2021-22~~2023-24 school year, the superintendent shall calculate state aid
14 as the greater of:
- 15 (1) The district's weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand ~~one hundred~~
16 ~~thirty-six~~five hundred ninety-five dollars;
- 17 (2) One hundred two percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
18 student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's
19 weighted student units, not to exceed the district's 2017-18 baseline
20 weighted student units, plus any weighted student units in excess of the
21 2017-18 baseline weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand
22 ~~one hundred thirty-six~~five hundred ninety-five dollars; or
- 23 (3) The district's baseline funding as established in subsection 1 less the
24 amount in paragraph 1, with the difference reduced by fifteen percent and
25 then the difference added to the amount determined in paragraph 1.
- 26 b. For the ~~2022-23~~2024-25 school year and each school year thereafter, the
27 superintendent shall calculate state aid as the greater of:
- 28 (1) The district's weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand ~~two hundred~~
29 ~~thirty-seven~~nine hundred thirteen dollars;
- 30 (2) One hundred two percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
31 student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's

1 weighted student units, not to exceed the district's 2017-18 baseline
2 weighted student units, plus any weighted student units in excess of the
3 2017-18 baseline weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand
4 ~~two hundred thirty-seven~~nine hundred thirteen dollars; or

5 (3) The district's baseline funding as established in subsection 1 less the
6 amount in paragraph 1, with the difference reduced by thirty percent for the
7 2022-23 school year and the reduction percentage increasing by fifteen
8 percent each school year thereafter until the difference is reduced to zero,
9 and then the difference added to the amount determined in paragraph 1.

10 e. ~~The superintendent also shall adjust state aid determined in this subsection to~~
11 ~~ensure the amount does not exceed the transition maximum as follows:~~

12 (1) ~~For the 2021-22 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred~~
13 ~~ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as~~
14 ~~established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's weighted student~~
15 ~~units from the previous school year.~~

16 (2) ~~For the 2022-23 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred~~
17 ~~ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as~~
18 ~~established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's weighted student~~
19 ~~units from the previous school year.~~

20 (3) ~~For the 2023-24 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred~~
21 ~~ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as~~
22 ~~established in subsection 2, plus twenty percent of the difference between~~
23 ~~the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and~~
24 ~~one hundred ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted~~
25 ~~student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the~~
26 ~~transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1~~
27 ~~of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units~~
28 ~~from the previous school year.~~

29 (4) ~~For the 2024-25 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred~~
30 ~~ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as~~
31 ~~established in subsection 2, plus forty percent of the difference between the~~

1 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred
2 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The
3 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum
4 rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of
5 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous
6 school year.

7 (5) For the 2025-26 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
8 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
9 established in subsection 2, plus sixty percent of the difference between the
10 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred
11 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The
12 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum
13 rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of
14 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous
15 school year.

16 (6) For the 2026-27 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
17 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
18 established in subsection 2, plus eighty percent of the difference between
19 the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and
20 one hundred ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
21 student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the
22 transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1
23 of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units
24 from the previous school year.

25 4. After determining the product in accordance with subsection 3, the superintendent of
26 public instruction shall:

27 a. Subtract an amount equal to sixty mills multiplied by the taxable valuation of the
28 school district, except the amount in dollars subtracted for purposes of this
29 subdivision may not exceed the previous year's amount in dollars subtracted for
30 purposes of this subdivision by more than twelve percent, adjusted pursuant to
31 section 15.1-27-04.3; and

- 1 b. Subtract an amount equal to seventy-five percent of all revenue types listed in
2 subdivisions c and d of subsection 1. Before determining the deduction for
3 seventy-five percent of all revenue types, the superintendent of public instruction
4 shall adjust revenues as follows:
- 5 (1) Tuition revenue shall be adjusted as follows:
- 6 (a) In addition to deducting tuition revenue received specifically for the
7 operation of an educational program provided at a residential
8 treatment facility, tuition revenue received for the provision of an adult
9 farm management program, and tuition received under an agreement
10 to educate students from a school district on an air force base with
11 funding received through federal impact aid as directed each school
12 year in paragraph 3 of subdivision c of subsection 1, the
13 superintendent of public instruction also shall reduce the total tuition
14 reported by the school district by the amount of tuition revenue
15 received for the education of students not residing in the state and for
16 which the state has not entered a cross-border education contract;
17 and
- 18 (b) The superintendent of public instruction also shall reduce the total
19 tuition reported by admitting school districts meeting the requirements
20 of subdivision e of subsection 2 of section 15.1-29-12 by the amount
21 of tuition revenue received for the education of students residing in an
22 adjacent school district.
- 23 (2) After adjusting tuition revenue as provided in paragraph 1, the
24 superintendent shall reduce all remaining revenues from all revenue types
25 by the percentage of mills levied in ~~2020~~2022 by the school district for
26 sinking and interest relative to the total mills levied in ~~2020~~2022 by the
27 school district for all purposes.
- 28 5. The amount remaining after the computation required under subsection 4 is the
29 amount of state aid to which a school district is entitled, subject to any other statutory
30 requirements or limitations.

- 1 6. On or before June thirtieth of each year, the school board shall certify to the
2 superintendent of public instruction the final average daily membership for the current
3 school year.
- 4 7. For purposes of the calculation in subsection 4, each county auditor, in collaboration
5 with the school districts, shall report the following to the superintendent of public
6 instruction on an annual basis:
 - 7 a. The amount of revenue received by each school district in the county during the
8 previous school year for each type of revenue identified in subdivisions c and d of
9 subsection 1;
 - 10 b. The total number of mills levied in the previous calendar year by each school
11 district for all purposes; and
 - 12 c. The number of mills levied in the previous calendar year by each school district
13 for sinking and interest fund purposes.

14 **Baseline funding - Establishment - Determination of state aid. (Effective after**
15 **June 30, 2025)**

- 16 1. To determine the amount of state aid payable to each district, the superintendent of
17 public instruction shall establish each district's baseline funding. A district's baseline
18 funding consists of:
 - 19 a. All state aid received by the district in accordance with chapter 15.1-27 during the
20 2018-19 school year;
 - 21 b. An amount equal to the property tax deducted by the superintendent of public
22 instruction to determine the 2018-19 state aid payment;
 - 23 c. An amount equal to seventy-five percent of the revenue received by the school
24 district during the 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types:
 - 25 (1) Revenue reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota school district
26 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the
27 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08;
 - 28 (2) Mineral revenue received by the school district through direct allocation from
29 the state treasurer and not reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota
30 school district financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by

- 1 the superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section
2 15.1-02-08;
- 3 (3) Tuition reported under code 1300 of the North Dakota school district
4 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the
5 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08,
6 with the exception of revenue received specifically for the operation of an
7 educational program provided at a residential treatment facility, tuition
8 received for the provision of an adult farm management program, and
9 beginning in the 2025-26 school year, eighty-five percent of tuition received
10 under an agreement to educate students from a school district on an
11 air force base with funding received through federal impact aid, until the
12 2026-27 school year, and each school year thereafter, when all tuition
13 received under an agreement to educate students from a school district on
14 an air force base with funding received through federal impact aid must be
15 excluded from the tuition calculation under this paragraph;
- 16 (4) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on the distribution and transmission
17 of electric power;
- 18 (5) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on electricity generated from
19 sources other than coal; and
- 20 (6) Revenue from the leasing of land acquired by the United States for which
21 compensation is allocated to the state under 33 U.S.C. 701(c)(3); and
- 22 d. An amount equal to the total revenue received by the school district during the
23 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types:
- 24 (1) Mobile home tax revenue;
- 25 (2) Telecommunications tax revenue; and
- 26 (3) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes and state reimbursement of the
27 homestead credit and disabled veterans credit.
- 28 e. Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall reduce the
29 baseline funding for any school district that becomes an elementary district
30 pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2012-13 school year. The reduction must
31 be proportional to the number of weighted student units in the grades that are

1 offered through another school district relative to the total number of weighted
2 student units the school district offered in the year before the school district
3 became an elementary district. The reduced baseline funding applies to the
4 calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district
5 becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter. For districts that
6 become an elementary district prior to the 2020-21 school year, the
7 superintendent shall use the reduced baseline funding to calculate state aid for
8 the 2020-21 school year and for each year thereafter.

- 9 2. a. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in
10 subsection 1 by the district's 2017-18 weighted student units to determine the
11 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit.
- 12 b. For any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section
13 15.1-07-27 after the 2017-18 school year, the superintendent shall adjust the
14 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit used to calculate state aid.
15 The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in
16 subsection 1 by the district's weighted student units after the school district
17 becomes an elementary district to determine the district's adjusted baseline
18 funding per weighted student unit. The superintendent shall use the district's
19 adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit in the calculation of state aid
20 for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary
21 district and for each year thereafter.
- 22 c. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year and for each school year thereafter, the
23 superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student
24 unit. Each year the superintendent shall calculate the amount by which the
25 district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per
26 weighted student unit provided in subsection 3. The superintendent shall reduce
27 the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit by fifteen percent of the
28 amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds
29 the payment per weighted student unit for the 2021-22 school year. For each
30 year thereafter, the reduction percentage is increased by an additional fifteen
31 percent. However, the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, after

1 the reduction, may not be less than the payment per weighted student unit
2 provided in subsection 3.

3 3. a. For the ~~2021-22~~2023-24 school year, the superintendent shall calculate state aid
4 as the greater of:

5 (1) The district's weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand ~~one hundred~~
6 ~~thirty-six~~five hundred ninety-five dollars;

7 (2) One hundred two percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
8 student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's
9 weighted student units, not to exceed the district's 2017-18 baseline
10 weighted student units, plus any weighted student units in excess of the
11 2017-18 baseline weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand
12 ~~one hundred thirty-six~~five hundred ninety-five dollars; or

13 (3) The district's baseline funding as established in subsection 1 less the
14 amount in paragraph 1, with the difference reduced by fifteen percent and
15 then the difference added to the amount determined in paragraph 1.

16 b. For the ~~2022-23~~2024-25 school year and each school year thereafter, the
17 superintendent shall calculate state aid as the greater of:

18 (1) The district's weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand ~~two hundred~~
19 ~~thirty-seven~~nine hundred thirteen dollars;

20 (2) One hundred two percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
21 student unit, as established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's
22 weighted student units, not to exceed the district's 2017-18 baseline
23 weighted student units, plus any weighted student units in excess of the
24 2017-18 baseline weighted student units multiplied by ten thousand
25 ~~two hundred thirty-seven~~nine hundred thirteen dollars; or

26 (3) The district's baseline funding as established in subsection 1 less the
27 amount in paragraph 1, with the difference reduced by thirty percent for the
28 2022-23 school year and the reduction percentage increasing by fifteen
29 percent each school year thereafter until the difference is reduced to zero,
30 and then the difference added to the amount determined in paragraph 1.

- 1 e. The superintendent also shall adjust state aid determined in this subsection to
2 ensure the amount does not exceed the transition maximum as follows:
- 3 (1) For the 2021-22 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
4 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
5 established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's weighted student
6 units from the previous school year.
- 7 (2) For the 2022-23 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
8 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
9 established in subsection 2, multiplied by the district's weighted student
10 units from the previous school year.
- 11 (3) For the 2023-24 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
12 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
13 established in subsection 2, plus twenty percent of the difference between
14 the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and
15 one hundred ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
16 student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the
17 transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1
18 of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units
19 from the previous school year.
- 20 (4) For the 2024-25 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
21 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
22 established in subsection 2, plus forty percent of the difference between the
23 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred
24 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The
25 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum
26 rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of
27 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous
28 school year.
- 29 (5) For the 2025-26 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
30 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
31 established in subsection 2, plus sixty percent of the difference between the

1 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred
2 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The
3 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum
4 rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of
5 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous
6 school year.

7 (6) For the 2026-27 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred
8 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as
9 established in subsection 2, plus eighty percent of the difference between
10 the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and
11 one hundred ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted
12 student unit. The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the
13 transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1
14 of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units
15 from the previous school year.

16 4. After determining the product in accordance with subsection 3, the superintendent of
17 public instruction shall:

- 18 a. Subtract an amount equal to sixty mills multiplied by the taxable valuation of the
19 school district; and
20 b. Subtract an amount equal to seventy-five percent of all revenue types listed in
21 subdivisions c and d of subsection 1. Before determining the deduction for
22 seventy-five percent of all revenue types, the superintendent of public instruction
23 shall adjust revenues as follows:

24 (1) Tuition revenue shall be adjusted as follows:

- 25 (a) In addition to deducting tuition revenue received specifically for the

11 (2) After adjusting tuition revenue as provided in paragraph 1, the
12 superintendent shall reduce all remaining revenues from all revenue types
13 by the percentage of mills levied in ~~2020~~2022 by the school district for
14 sinking and interest relative to the total mills levied in ~~2020~~2022 by the
15 school district for all purposes.

16 5. The amount remaining after the computation required under subsection 4 is the
17 amount of state aid to which a school district is entitled, subject to any other statutory
18 requirements or limitations.

19 6. On or before June thirtieth of each year, the school board shall certify to the
20 superintendent of public instruction the final average daily membership for the current
21 school year.

22 7. For purposes of the calculation in subsection 4, each county auditor, in collaboration

1 **SECTION 12.** A new section to chapter 15.1-32 of the North Dakota Century Code is
2 created and enacted as follows:

3 **Private tutors.**

4 A school district shall permit private tutors to provide tutoring services on school premises.

5 **SECTION 13. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-36-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is
6 amended and reenacted as follows:

7 **15.1-36-02. Coal development trust fund - Board of university and school lands -**
8 **School construction projects - Unanticipated construction projects and emergency**
9 **repairs - Loans.**

- 10 1. Up to sixty million dollars from the coal development trust fund is available to the
11 board of university and school lands for loans under this section.
- 12 2. To be eligible for a loan under this section, the school district must demonstrate a need
13 based on an unanticipated construction project, an unanticipated replacement project,
14 or an emergency repair or situation, and the board of a school district shall:
- 15 a. Obtain the approval of the superintendent of public instruction for the construction
16 project under section 15.1-36-01; and
- 17 b. Submit to the superintendent of public instruction an application containing all
18 information deemed necessary by the superintendent, including potential
19 alternative sources or methods of financing the construction project.
- 20 3. The superintendent of public instruction shall consider each loan application in the
21 order ~~it~~the application received approval under section 15.1-36-01.
- 22 4. If the superintendent of public instruction approves the loan, the board of university
23 and school lands shall issue a loan from the coal development trust fund.
- 24 a. For a loan made under this section:
- 25 a. (1) The minimum loan amount is two hundred fifty thousand dollars and the
26 maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is ~~two~~five
27 million dollars;
- 28 b. (2) The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district
29 requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and
- 30 e. (3) The interest rate of the loan may not exceed two percent per year.

- 1 b. For a loan made under this section which includes additional expenses due to
2 unanticipated construction inflation:
- 3 (1) The unanticipated construction inflation must have occurred for a
4 construction project bid after January 1, 2021, and before June 30, 2024;
- 5 (2) The maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is five
6 million dollars;
- 7 (3) The interest rate on the loan may not exceed two percent per year;
- 8 (4) The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district
9 requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and
- 10 (5) The school district may pledge revenues derived from its general fund levy
11 authority or other sources of revenue authorized by law.
- 12 5. a. If a school district seeking a loan under this section received an allocation of the
13 oil and gas gross production tax during the previous fiscal year in accordance
14 with chapter 57-51, the board of the district shall provide to the board of
15 university and school lands, and to the state treasurer, its evidence of
16 indebtedness indicating ~~that~~ the loan originated under this section.
- 17 b. If the evidence of indebtedness is payable solely from the school district's
18 allocation of the oil and gas gross production tax in accordance with section
19 57-51-15, the loan does not constitute a general obligation of the school district
20 and may not be considered a debt of the district.
- 21 c. If a loan made to a school district is payable solely from the district's allocation of
22 the oil and gas gross production tax in accordance with section 57-51-15, the
23 terms of the loan must require ~~that~~ the state treasurer withhold the dollar amount
24 or percentage specified in the loan agreement, from each of the district's oil and
25 gas gross production tax allocations, in order to repay the principal and interest of
26 the evidence of indebtedness. The state treasurer shall deposit the amount
27 withheld into the fund from which the loan originated.
- 28 d. Any evidence of indebtedness executed by the board of a school district under
29 this subsection is a negotiable instrument and not subject to taxation by the state
30 or any political subdivision of the state.

1 6. For purposes of this section, a "construction project" means the purchase, lease,
2 erection, or improvement of any structure or facility by a school board, provided the
3 acquisition or activity is within a school board's authority.

4 **SECTION 14. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-36-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is
5 amended and reenacted as follows:

6 **15.1-36-04. Evidences of indebtedness.**

7 The board of a school district may issue and sell evidences of indebtedness under
8 ~~chapter~~chapters 21-02 and 21-03 to finance the construction or improvement of a project
9 approved under this chapter. The principal amount of the loan and the evidences of
10 indebtedness to repay the loan may not exceed the loan amount for which the district is eligible
11 under ~~this chapter~~ 21-03. Evidences of indebtedness issued under this chapter constitute a
12 general obligation of the school district.

13 **SECTION 15. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 5 of section 15.1-36-08 of the North Dakota
14 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15 5. If the superintendent of public instruction approves the loan, the Bank of North Dakota
16 shall issue a loan from the school construction assistance revolving loan fund. For a
17 loan made under this section:

- 18 a. ~~The~~If the school construction project totals less than seventy-five million dollars,
19 the maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is ten million
20 dollars. However, if a school district's unobligated general fund balance on the
21 preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 15.1-27-35.3, the
22 loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent of the project's
23 cost up to a maximum loan amount of eight million dollars;
- 24 b. If the school construction project totals seventy-five million dollars or more, the
25 maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is fifty million
26 dollars. However, if a school district's unobligated general fund balance on the
27 preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 15.1-27-35.3, the
28 loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent of the project's
29 cost up to a maximum loan amount of forty million dollars;
- 30 c. The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district
31 requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and

- 1 e.d. The interest rate of the loan may not exceed two percent per year.
- 2 e. A district with a school construction loan secured on the open bond market may
- 3 apply to refinance the loan when callable with the school construction assistance
- 4 revolving loan fund under this subsection.
- 5 f. A district that qualifies for a loan under subdivision b, which was approved for a
- 6 loan of up to ten million dollars for a construction project bid after January 1,
- 7 2021, and before June 30, 2024, may apply for a loan in an amount equal to the
- 8 difference between fifty million dollars and the amount of the approved loan.

9 **SECTION 16. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - COMPOSITION OF THE STATE**

10 **BOARD OF PUBLIC SCHOOL EDUCATION.**

- 11 1. During the 2023-24 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the
- 12 composition of the state board of public school education. The study must include:
- 13 a. An analysis of the state board of public school education boundaries, including a
- 14 comparison of methodologies for creating the boundaries;
- 15 b. An analysis of the inclusion of representatives from small, large, urban, and rural
- 16 schools on the board;
- 17 c. An evaluation of term limits for board members, including staggering terms to
- 18 ensure continuity of knowledge;
- 19 d. An evaluation of the benefits and consequences of requiring the composition of
- 20 the board to include two school district superintendents, two members of a board
- 21 of a school district, and two citizens at large;
- 22 e. An evaluation of the benefits and consequences of requiring a minimum or
- 23 maximum number of candidates to be submitted to the governor and permitting
- 24 the governor to request a new list of potential candidates once; and
- 25 f. An analysis of the role and practices of the county superintendent of schools.
- 26 2. The legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together
- 27 with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-ninth
- 28 legislative assembly.

29 **SECTION 17. TEACHER SHORTAGE AND MILITARY FAMILIES TASK FORCE -**

30 **REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.** During the 2023-24 interim, the superintendent of

31 public instruction shall establish a teacher shortage and military families task force to examine

1 employer recruitment needs, applicable state regulations, and benefit options for kindergarten
2 through grade twelve educators within the state, including potential barriers to military personnel
3 and spouses teaching in the classroom. The task force shall identify immediate and long-term
4 public policy strategies to address teacher shortage and support for military families and
5 spouses. The task force shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
6 legislation necessary to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

7 **SECTION 18. APPROPRIATION - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - GRANTS**
8 **FOR FREE MEALS.** There is appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state
9 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$6,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be
10 necessary, to the department of public instruction for the purpose of providing grants to school
11 districts to defray the expenses of providing meals, free of charge, for all students enrolled in
12 public school at or below two hundred percent of the federal poverty guideline, for the biennium
13 beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. The superintendent of public instruction shall
14 develop guidelines and reporting requirements for the grants.

15 **SECTION 19. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF**
16 **PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - SCIENCE OF READING - REPORT.** There is appropriated out of any
17 moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum
18 of \$1,000,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public
19 instruction for the purpose of supporting professional learning related to the science of reading
20 and implementing systematic direct literacy instruction, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023,
21 and ending June 30, 2025. The superintendent of public instruction shall collaborate with the
22 regional education associations to ensure continuity of access to science of reading training
23 opportunities and develop support processes to deepen science of reading implementation. The
24 superintendent of public instruction shall provide quarterly reports to the legislative
25 management on the implementation and effectiveness of this appropriation on improving
26 educational outcomes, including the number of teachers trained, an anticipated timeline of
27 results trends, and any results trends available.

28 **SECTION 20. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF**
29 **PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - DYSLEXIA IDENTIFICATION TRAINING.** There is appropriated out
30 of any moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated,
31 the sum of \$279,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the department of public

1 instruction for the purpose of providing training in identification of dyslexia characteristics to one
2 educator in every school that instructs students in kindergarten through third grade for one year,
3 for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

4 **SECTION 21. APPROPRIATION - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND - DEPARTMENT OF**
5 **PUBLIC INSTRUCTION - READING LEARNING PLATFORM TRAINING.** There is

6 appropriated out of any moneys in the public instruction fund in the state treasury, not otherwise
7 appropriated, the sum of \$558,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, to the
8 department of public instruction for the purpose of providing training in a reading learning
9 platform approved by the superintendent of public instruction to one educator in every school
10 that instructs students in kindergarten through third grade for two years, for the biennium
11 beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

12 **SECTION 22. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.**

13 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies
14 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2021-23 biennium, any moneys remain in
15 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 13 of the 2021
16 Session Laws, the lesser of \$1,000,000 or the remaining amount must be continued into the
17 2023-25 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the
18 public instruction fund for the purpose of funding professional learning related to the science of
19 reading and implementing systematic direct literacy instruction as appropriated in section 19 of
20 this Act.

21 **SECTION 23. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.**

22 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies
23 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2021-23 biennium, any moneys remain in
24 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 13 of the 2021
25 Session Laws, the lesser of \$837,000 or the remaining amount must be continued into the
26 2023-25 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer this amount into the
27 public instruction fund for the purpose of funding training in identification of dyslexia
28 characteristics and reading training for kindergarten through grade three teachers as
29 appropriated in sections 20 and 21 of this Act.

30 **SECTION 24. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL**
31 **CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND.** The office of management and

1 budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the
2 school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023,
3 and ending June 30, 2025.

4 **SECTION 25. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 9 of this Act becomes effective on July 1, 2024.

5 **SECTION 26. EXPIRATION DATE.** Section 13 of this Act is effective through June 30,
6 2025, and after that date is ineffective.

7 **SECTION 27. EMERGENCY.** Section 13 of this Act is declared to be an emergency
8 measure.
