8   **General Description:**

31 Section 1. Section **26-2-3** is amended to read:

32 **26-2-3. Department duties and authority.**

33 (1) As used in this section:

34 (a) "Compact" means the Compact for Interstate Sharing of Putative Father Registry  
35 Information created in Section [78B-6-121.5](#), effective on May 10, 2016.

36 (b) "Putative father":

37 (i) means the same as that term is as defined in Section [78B-6-121.5](#); and

38 (ii) includes an unmarried biological father.

39 (c) "State registrar" means the state registrar of vital records appointed under  
40 Subsection (2)(e).

41 (d) "Unmarried biological father" means the same as that term is defined in Section  
42 [78B-6-103](#).

43 (2) The department shall:

44 (a) provide offices properly equipped for the preservation of vital records made or  
45 received under this chapter;

46 (b) establish a statewide vital records system for the registration, collection,  
47 preservation, amendment, and certification of vital records and other similar documents  
48 required by this chapter and activities related to them, including the tabulation, analysis, and  
49 publication of vital statistics;

50 (c) prescribe forms for certificates, certification, reports, and other documents and  
51 records necessary to establish and maintain a statewide system of vital records;

52 (d) prepare an annual compilation, analysis, and publication of statistics derived from  
53 vital records; and

83 Section 2. Section 26-18-2.6 is amended to read:

84 **26-18-2.6. Dental benefits.**

85 (1) (a) Except as provided in Subsection (8), the division shall establish a competitive

86 bid process to bid out Medicaid dental benefits under this chapter.

87 (b) The division may bid out the Medicaid dental benefits separately from other  
88 program benefits.

89 (2) The division shall use the following criteria to evaluate dental bids:

90 (a) ability to manage dental expenses;

91 (b) proven ability to handle dental insurance;

92 (c) efficiency of claim paying procedures;

93 (d) provider contracting, discounts, and adequacy of network; and

94 (e) other criteria established by the department.

95 (3) The division shall request bids for the program's benefits:

96 (a) in 2011; and

97 (b) at least once every five years thereafter.

98 (4) The division's contract with dental plans for the program's benefits shall include  
99 risk sharing provisions in which the dental plan must accept 100% of the risk for any difference  
100 between the division's premium payments per client and actual dental expenditures.

101 (5) The division may not award contracts to:

119 (ii) use funds from the Division of Family Health and Preparedness that are available to

129 **26-18-407. Medicaid waiver for autism spectrum disorder.**

130 (1) As used in this section:

131 (a) "Autism spectrum disorder" is as defined by the most recent edition of the  
132 Diagnostic and Statistical Manual on Mental Disorders or a recent edition of a professionally  
133 accepted diagnostic manual.

134 (b) "Program" means the autism spectrum disorder program created in Subsection (3).

135 (c) "Qualified child" means a child who is:

136 (i) at least two years of age but less than seven years of age; and

137 (ii) diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder by a qualified professional.

138 (2) The department shall apply for a Medicaid waiver with the Centers for Medicare  
139 and Medicaid Services within the United States Department of Health and Human Services to  
140 implement, within the state Medicaid program, the program described in Subsection (3).

141 (3) The department shall offer an autism spectrum disorder program that:

142 (a) as funding permits, provides treatment for autism spectrum disorders to qualified  
143 children; and

144 (b) accepts applications for the program during periods of open enrollment.

145 (4) The department shall:

146 (a) convene a public process with the Department of Human Services to determine the  
147 benefits and services the program shall offer qualified children that considers, in addition to  
148 any other relevant factor:

149 (i) demonstrated effective treatments;

150 (ii) methods to engage family members in the treatment process; and

151 (iii) outreach to qualified children in rural and underserved areas of the state; and

152 (b) evaluate the ongoing results, cost, and effectiveness of the program.

159 Section 4. Section **26-18-408** is amended to read:

160 **26-18-408. Incentives to appropriately use emergency department services.**

161 (1) (a) This section applies to the Medicaid program and to the Utah Children's Health  
162 Insurance Program created in Chapter 40, Utah Children's Health Insurance Act.

163 (b) For purposes of this section:

164 (i) "Accountable care organization" means a Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance  
165 Program administrator that contracts with the Medicaid program or the Children's Health  
166 Insurance Program to deliver health care through an accountable care plan.

167 (ii) "Accountable care plan" means a risk based delivery service model authorized by  
168 Section [26-18-405](#) and administered by an accountable care organization.

169 (iii) "Nonemergent care":

170 (A) means use of the emergency department to receive health care that is nonemergent  
171 as defined by the department by administrative rule adopted in accordance with Title 63G,  
172 Chapter 3, Utah Administrative Rulemaking Act, and the Emergency Medical Treatment and  
173 Active Labor Act; and

174 (B) does not mean the medical services provided to a recipient required by the  
175 Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act, including services to conduct a medical  
176 screening examination to determine if the recipient has an emergent or nonemergent condition.

177 (iv) "Professional compensation" means payment made for services rendered to a  
178 Medicaid recipient by an individual licensed to provide health care services.

179 (v) "Super-utilizer" means a Medicaid recipient who has been identified by the  
180 recipient's accountable care organization as a person who uses the emergency department  
181 excessively, as defined by the accountable care organization.

182 (2) (a) An accountable care organization may, in accordance with Subsections (2)(b)  
183 and (c):

184 (i) audit emergency department services provided to a recipient enrolled in the  
185 accountable care plan to determine if nonemergent care was provided to the recipient; and

186 (ii) establish differential payment for emergent and nonemergent care provided in an  
187 emergency department.

188 (b) (i) The differential payments under Subsection (2)(a)(ii) do not apply to  
189 professional compensation for services rendered in an emergency department.

190 (ii) Except in cases of suspected fraud, waste, and abuse, an accountable care  
191 organization's audit of payment under Subsection (2)(a)(i) is limited to the 18-month period of  
192 time after the date on which the medical services were provided to the recipient. If fraud,  
193 waste, or abuse is alleged, the accountable care organization's audit of payment under  
194 Subsection (2)(a)(i) is limited to three years after the date on which the medical services were  
195 provided to the recipient.

196 (c) The audits and differential payments under Subsections (2)(a) and (b) apply to  
197 services provided to a recipient on or after July 1, 2015.

- 198 (3) An accountable care organization shall:
- 199 (a) use the savings under Subsection (2) to maintain and improve access to primary  
200 care and urgent care services for all of the recipients enrolled in the accountable care plan;
- 201 (b) provide viable alternatives for increasing primary care provider reimbursement  
202 rates to incentivize after hours primary care access for recipients; and
- 203 (c) report to the department on how the accountable care organization complied with  
204 this Subsection (3).
- 205 (4) The department shall:
- 206 (a) through administrative rule adopted by the department, develop quality  
207 measurements that evaluate an accountable care organization's delivery of:
- 208 (i) appropriate emergency department services to recipients enrolled in the accountable  
209 care plan;
- 210 (ii) expanded primary care and urgent care for recipients enrolled in the accountable  
211 care plan, with consideration of the accountable care organization's:
- 212 (A) delivery of primary care, urgent care, and after hours care through means other than  
213 the emergency department;
- 214 (B) recipient access to primary care providers and community health centers including  
215 evening and weekend access; and
- 216 (C) other innovations for expanding access to primary care; and
- 217 (iii) quality of care for the accountable care plan members;
- 218 (b) compare the quality measures developed under Subsection (4)(a) for each  
219 accountable care organization and share the data and quality measures developed under  
220 Subsection (4)(a) with the Health Data Committee created in Chapter 33a, Utah Health Data  
221 Authority Act;
- 222 (c) apply for a Medicaid waiver and a Children's Health Insurance Program waiver  
223 with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services within the United States Department of  
224 Health and Human Services, to:
- 225 (i) allow the program to charge recipients who are enrolled in an accountable care plan

245 (C) assist with transportation to primary care visits if transportation is a barrier to  
246 appropriate care for the recipient; and  
247 (v) sharing of medical records between health care providers and emergency  
248 departments for Medicaid recipients.  
249 (5) The Health Data Committee may publish data in accordance with Chapter 33a,  
250 Utah Health Data Authority Act, which compares the quality measures for the accountable care  
251 plans.  
252 (6) The department shall report to the Legislature's Health and Human Services Interim  
253 Committee [~~on or before October 1, 2016,~~] every two years regarding implementation of this

256 **26-56-103. Hemp extract registration card -- Application -- Fees -- Database.**

257 (1) The department shall issue a hemp extract registration card to an individual who:

258 (a) is at least 18 years of age;

259 (b) is a Utah resident;

260 (c) provides the department with a statement signed by a neurologist that:

261 (i) indicates that the individual:

262 (A) suffers from intractable epilepsy; and

263 (B) may benefit from treatment with hemp extract; and

264 (ii) is consistent with a record from the neurologist, concerning the individual,

265 contained in the database described in Subsection (8);

266 (d) pays the department a fee in an amount established by the department under

267 Subsection (5); and

268 (e) submits an application to the department, on a form created by the department, that

269 contains:

270 (i) the individual's name and address;

271 (ii) a copy of the individual's valid photo identification; and

272 (iii) any other information the department considers necessary to implement this

298 Subsections (1)(e)(iii) and (2)(e)(iv); and

299 (b) establish, in accordance with recommendations from the Department of Public  
300 Safety, the form and content of the hemp extract registration card.

301 (5) The department shall establish fees in accordance with Section [63J-1-504](#) that are  
302 no greater than the amount necessary to cover the cost the department incurs to implement this  
303 chapter.

304 (6) The registration cards issued under Subsections (1) and (2) are:

306 (b) renewable, if, at the time of renewal, the registrant meets the requirements of either

311 registrant or minor under a registrant's care, including the patient's response to hemp extract;

313 (b) transmit the record described in Subsection (7)(a) to the department.

315 (a) maintain a database of the records described in Subsection (7);

316 (b) treat the records as identifiable health data, as defined in Section 26-3-1; and

317 (c) establish a procedure for ensuring that neurologists transmit the records described  
318 in Subsection (7).

319 (9) (a) The department shall prepare a de-identified set of data based on records  
320 described in Subsection (8) and make the set of data available to researchers at a higher  
321 education institution for the purpose of studying hemp extract.

322 (b) No later than July 1, 2016, the department shall, in accordance with Title 63G,  
323 Chapter 6a, Utah Procurement Code, request proposals to conduct a study of hemp extract.

324 (c) The study of hemp extract shall include at least the following:

328 (iii) any adverse effects or other effects on the patient that may be attributable to the  
329 patient's use of hemp extract.

330 (d) The department shall report to the Health and Human Services Interim Committee

332 year until November 30, 2019, on the study of hemp extract.

334 **49-20-106. Obesity report.**

335 (1) The Public Employees' Health Plan shall report to the Health and Human Services  
336 Interim Committee every two years by no later than the Health and Human Services Interim  
337 Committee's November [2016] interim meeting regarding the analysis required by Subsection

- 338 (2).
- 339 (2) For purposes of the report required by Subsection (1), the Public Employees' Health
- 340 Plan shall:
- 341 (a) estimate the costs and benefits to the Public Employees' Health Plan associated with
- 342 providing insurance coverage for anti-obesity treatment, including:

- 344 (ii) medication; and

360 (a) "Coordinator" means the state suicide prevention coordinator described in Section

361 [62A-15-1101](#).

362 (b) "Legal intervention" means an incident in which an individual is shot by another

363 individual who has legal authority to use deadly force.

364 (c) "Shooter" means an individual who uses a gun in an act that results in the death of

365 the actor or another individual, whether the act was a suicide, homicide, legal intervention, act

366 of self-defense, or accident.

367 (2) The coordinator shall, by October 30, 2018, conduct a study on use of guns in the  
368 state and on an ongoing basis report on the progress and findings of the study to the Health and  
369 Human Services Interim Committee.

370 [~~(3) By October 30, 2016, the coordinator shall:~~]

371 [~~(a) determine what information, and from which state, local, and federal agencies, will
